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2008: HAPPY DEMOCRATS, CONCERNED REPUBLICANS

April 9-12, 2007

Democratic primary voters are much more likely than Republican primary voters to say they are satisfied with the current field of contenders for their party's nomination. Now, with nine months left before the Iowa Caucuses, the differences between the parties on this question are even greater than they were just a month ago. Six in ten Democratic voters are content with their choices, while six in ten Republican voters are not.

This is a reversal from previous elections, when Democrats tended to be less satisfied than Republicans with their options.

While many of those who say they will vote in a Republican primary or caucus want more choices, most are unable to name a specific candidate they would like to see run. 11% of those who want more choices want to see former Senator (and actor) Fred Thompson run, and 8% pick former Speaker of the House Newt Gingrich. No one else was mentioned by more than 2%.

On the Democratic side, most of the third who'd like another candidate to join the race can't suggest anyone. Those who do name someone reach back to the past, mentioning former candidates Al Gore, Bill Bradley, and even former President (and ineligible candidate) Bill Clinton.

Among those actually running for the nomination, Democratic voters continue to give Hillary Rodham Clinton a lead, while John McCain appears to have lost ground on his party's frontrunner, Rudy Giuliani.

THE RACE FOR THE REPUBLICAN NOMINATION

Among those who intend to vote in a Republican primary or caucus next year, former New York Mayor Rudy Giuliani's lead in a hypothetical 2-way match-up with Arizona Senator John McCain has widened this month, and is now back to its February levels.

Giuliani continues to draw more support than McCain among both conservatives and moderates.

Each candidate's voters differ somewhat in what they volunteer as the nation's top problem. While 29% of McCain's voters cite the war in Iraq as the nation's top concern and 25% of Giuliani's voters agree, Giuliani's voters cite illegal immigration (16% do) more often than McCain's voters (8% of whom do). Both sets of voters are about equally likely to name terrorism.

Former Massachusetts Governor Mitt Romney runs third in a contest with McCain and Giuliani, although he has now made his fundraising prowess known to the political world. Romney draws support from both the McCain and Giuliani voters in the 2-way race.

GOP primary voters are most likely to think Giuliani will ultimately win the nomination. Most of McCain's backers expect McCain to win, though they are more pessimistic about their candidate's chances than Giuliani's backers are about his.

This early in the campaign, voters associate the major Republican candidates with their prominent accomplishments, more so than their policy positions or perceived ideology.

Asked the first things that come to mind when voters hear the name Rudy Giuliani, the September 11th attacks and his former title, Mayor of New York, are by far the most-mentioned. Almost no one volunteers his stance on abortion policy or his ideology, generally, or personal issues such as his marital history.

John McCain's name is mainly associated with his war record as a POW in Vietnam. Few mention his ideology. Most voters cannot name anything about Mitt Romney off the top of their heads, but those who do cite his former position as Governor or his Mormon religion.

Even though few mention Giuliani's marital history, Republican primary voters are much more likely than the nation's voters as a whole to say they care about a candidate's personal life as opposed to solely judging them on their political record.

Giuliani leads McCain in the 2-way match-up among both those who would judge the personal and the political, and those sticking only to the political.

When asked specifically about two particular personal issues, multiple divorces (a Giuliani concern) and age (McCain is 70), most Republican primary voters say each of these issues would make no difference in their vote for a candidate. About one in four would resist a candidate divorced more than once and about the same number would shy away from one age 70 or over.

Primary voters of all age groups say a candidate being 70-plus doesn't matter to them. Those who say they would \underline{not} prefer a candidate 70 and over are backing Giuliani over McCain. Among those who don't want a candidate who was divorced more than once, the race between McCain and Giuliani is even.

Like their Democratic counterparts, Republican Primary voters have favorable views of all three of their leading candidates. McCain, Giuliani and Romney have all become better known to GOP primary voters since last month, and favorable opinions of them have all risen.

But in the eyes of <u>all</u> voters, not just Republicans, Giuliani and McCain now face more unfavorable ratings now than they did in March, as they have become better-known. This shift is driven by Independents and Democrats. Unfavorable views of both Giuliani and McCain have risen among Independent voters since last month.

JOHN MCCAIN AND THE IRAQ WAR

McCain's current position on the Iraq war - as an outspoken supporter of the "surge" of U.S. troops - <u>may</u> hurt his overall assessment with voters, but it is a net <u>positive</u> for him among Republican primary voters. These voters strongly support the war and six in ten of them believe, much like McCain, the troop surge is succeeding.

But many of those Republican primary voters say they are <u>not</u> factoring McCain's Iraq stance into their consideration of him so far: 44% say his war position makes no difference in their decision whether or not to vote for him. Among those who <u>are</u> weighing McCain's Iraq views, McCain <u>benefits</u>: more say they'll back the Arizona Senator because of his Iraq positions (26%) than would vote against him because of them (16%).

However, McCain's stance on Iraq is a net negative for him among all voters, though once again many say it makes no difference. There was not much difference in responses on this between those interviewed before and after McCain's Wednesday speech.

Though McCain has been a strong supporter of President Bush's Iraq policy in general, right now most Republican primary voters predict that a President McCain, if elected, would follow <u>different</u> strategies in Iraq than George W. Bush.

Republican primary voters give George W. Bush high marks for his handling of the war - much higher than Americans overall: two-thirds of them approve of Bush's performance on Iraq, while only about one in three Americans overall does.

One of McCain's central arguments on Iraq - that withdrawal now would only embolden terrorists - finds particular favor among Republican primary voters: 61% of them think a U.S. pullout now would increase the terror threat to the U.S. This is dramatically different from Americans' sentiments overall; only 30% of all Americans foresee that increased risk.

THE RACE FOR THE DEMOCRATIC NOMINATION

Democrats continue to look forward to the 2008 election campaign — they are satisfied with the people currently running, and they like all three major contenders for their party's nomination. Right now, with nine months left before the Iowa caucuses, Democratic primary voters favor Hillary Clinton and expect her to be the Democratic nominee. But this early in the campaign, many voters have less than clear perceptions of some of their candidates.

In a three-way contest, Democrats choose Hillary Rodham Clinton over her closest challengers, Senator Barack Obama and former Senator John Edwards. Clinton leads Obama by 15 points, and Edwards by 18.

Clinton continues to fare better with women than with men, and better among Democratic identifiers than with those Independent voters who say they would vote in the Democratic primary.

Still, Democratic voters like all three of their frontrunners. Far more have favorable views of each candidate than have unfavorable views. Senator Clinton is the best known of the three, and more Democratic voters express an opinion of her than of the two men. Obama and Edwards receive very similar ratings from Democratic voters.

In recent weeks, the ratio of opinions about Barack Obama has become slightly less positive among Democratic voters.

Democratic voters are still only hazily aware of these contenders, and when they are asked to describe the first thing that comes to mind about the candidates, their answers are more biographical than either issue or character oriented. 28% of Democratic primary voters think first of Bill Clinton when given Hillary Clinton's name, with the next most popular answer her terms as First Lady. Only then do characteristics like strong leader and intelligence emerge.

For Barack Obama, the answers are a generalized "he's good, I like him," African-American, and Senator, though a number of Democratic voters comment on his age and intelligence. As many Democratic voters say he is a fresh face as say he is inexperienced. And John Edwards registers his service as John Kerry's running mate, although his wife's battle with cancer is a popular answer.

When asked specifically whether John and Elizabeth Edwards' actions since announcing her cancer recurrence made people feel differently about John Edwards, the overwhelming answer among Democratic primary voters was "no," expressed by 78%. 14% said it made them feel more

favorably towards him, while 7% said it made them less favorable. Americans as a whole feel pretty much the same way.

Senator Clinton remains a polarizing figure among all voters, however. She is the only one of the leading three Democratic contenders who gets a negative assessment from all registered voters. Obama and Edwards are both more liked than disliked, although many still express no opinion about them. Edwards appears to have gained a bit in overall favorability since last month.

Americans and Democratic voters agree on who the Democratic frontrunner is, and it's Hillary Rodham Clinton.

Since 1989, a member of the Bush or Clinton family has been President of the United States, and that doesn't seem to bother most Americans. Six in 10 do not think it makes any difference that a member of the Clinton or Bush family has occupied the White House for nearly 20 years. 31% do think it is a bad thing for the country, while 4% think it's a good thing. Independents are more likely than both Republicans and Democrats to say it is a bad thing for the country - 42% say it is.

WHO ELSE WILL GET IN THE RACE?

Speculation continues about possible candidates who may join the race, like Al Gore on the Democratic side, and former House Speaker Newt Gingrich and former Senator Fred Thompson on the Republican side.

Although relatively few Democratic voters are looking for other candidates, Al Gore is well-known and well-liked by Democrats. More than six in 10 Democratic primary voters hold a favorable view of Gore (similar to the number who views Hillary Clinton favorably). Registered voters overall are a bit more divided in the opinions of the former Vice President: 38% view him favorably, while 41% view him unfavorably.

Moreover, most Democratic primary voters think Gore has struck the right balance between protecting both environmental and economic concerns. Among voters nationwide, 47% say Gore's positions strike the right balance, but 37% say his positions go too far in protecting the environment at the expense of economic concerns.

More Republican voters are looking for other choices, but so far many don't know much about Thompson, and there are Republicans who view Gingrich negatively. Nearly eight in 10 Republican primary voters are undecided or haven't heard enough about Fred Thompson, but 21% have a favorable view of the Law & Order actor. No Republican primary voter views him unfavorably. 33% of Republican primary voters have a favorable opinion of Gingrich, but 25% view him negatively.

Some of the dissatisfaction on the Republican side may stem from the fact that most self-identified Republicans - 65% - think their party has abandoned the principles of former President Ronald Reagan. Republican primary voters who think the Republican party has gone in a different direction are more likely to be dissatisfied with the current field of Republican candidates.

MONEY AND POLITICS

Even though some Americans are personally bothered by the amount of money the 2008 candidates have raised - a new record - most say a candidate's fundraising does not affect their views of him or her.

Although 38% of Americans are personally bothered by the amount of money the presidential candidates have raised so far, 56% say they are not bothered by it. Democrats and Republicans hold similar views on this.

Most Americans say the amount of money a candidate is able to raise does not impact their view of him or her.

55% of Americans are paying attention to reports about how much money presidential candidates have raised, including 21% who are paying a lot of attention. Those who are paying more attention to campaign finance reports are more likely to be bothered by the amount of money raised by candidates.

This poll was conducted among a random sample of 994 adults nationwide, interviewed by telephone April 9-12, 2007. The error due to sampling for results based on the entire sample could be plus or minus three percentage points. The error for subgroups is higher.
