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THE PRESIDENTIAL RACE HEADING INTO THE FIRST DEBATE September 21-24, 2008

There has been no change in the race for President since last week, with Democrat Barack Obama leading Republican John McCain by five points among registered voters. Interest in the presidential debate still scheduled for Friday -- is high, with more than six in ten voters say they are very likely to watch the presidential debate tomorrow night.

With 40 days until the election, 30% of the electorate remains uncommitted, saying they could still change their minds about their candidate, or they are undecided entirely. This is up slightly from last week when 26% were uncommitted. In this poll, 44% of these uncommitted voters are Independents. Most of this poll was conducted before John McCain's announcement that he was suspending his campaign and heading back to Washington.

<u>Obama leads</u> McCain with women, moderates, Democrats, and younger voters. He is also getting the support of 61% of those who voted for Hillary Clinton in the Democratic primary.

 $\underline{\text{McCain has the edge}}$ with men, conservatives, and whites, including white men.

The race is even among white women, and McCain has a 7-point lead with white Catholics. George W. Bush beat John Kerry by double-digits among both these groups in 2004.

<u>Independents</u> break 43% for McCain and 39% for Obama in this poll. This swing group has lived up to its name. Obama had the edge with Independents last week, and earlier in the month, after the Republican convention, McCain was winning their support.

LOOKING AHEAD TO THE DEBATE

Over six in 10 registered voters say it is very likely that they will watch the first presidential debate between Barack Obama and John McCain tomorrow night, larger than the interest expressed before the first 2000 debate between Al Gore and George W. Bush - the last time two candidates were vying for their first term as president. 26% say it is at least somewhat likely they will watch.

Most voters say they will tune in to get a better understanding of the candidates' positions on the issues, especially the economy - not foreign policy, the scheduled subject of debate one. Uncommitted voters - those who have yet to choose a candidate or might still change their minds - are similar to voters overall in what they want to learn, though they are more likely to focus particularly on learning the differences between the two candidates.

Nearly half of uncommitted voters say the debates will have a great deal of influence in deciding how they will vote for in November. Less than a third of voters overall agree.

THE TALE OF THE TAPE: OBAMA VS. MCCAIN ON QUALITIES, POLICIES

This poll compares John McCain and Barack Obama on a range of qualities - and each goes into the debate with distinct advantages.

- Obama inspires more confidence on handling the economy, the nation's number-one issue.
 - o Obama holds a 12-point edge over McCain on making voters very confident about his ability.
- McCain has the edge on dealing with terrorism. 40% of voters are very confident in McCain's ability to protect the country from it, as opposed to 28% who say that of Obama.

- However it is essential to note: a majority of voters are at least <u>somewhat</u> confident in *either* Obama or McCain's abilities to deal with either the economy or terrorism.
- The candidates are about even in perceptions of handling Iraq, and foreign policy generally.

Voters see stark differences in the likely policies of the two candidates.

- Voters worry McCain would be <u>too quick</u> to use military force in dealing with other countries, and not use diplomacy enough. Voters worry Obama might be <u>too slow</u> to use force, even if diplomacy wasn't working.
- Voters think McCain cares more about large corporations than ordinary people. They think Obama would favor people over corporations.

CANDIDATE QUALITIES

Obama and McCain each have challenges to meet.

- <u>Obama has the edge on empathy</u>: Most voters say Obama understands their needs and problems; fewer think McCain does.
- <u>McCain has the edge on leading the military</u>: far more think he is likely to be an effective commander in chief, as has been the case throughout this campaign.

On foreign policy matters (the scheduled topic of the debate) each candidate has advantages as well as weaknesses.

Both have work to do shoring up voters' confidence that they could handle an international crisis - neither Obama nor McCain elicits confidence from a majority of voters.

Both are seen as being knowledgeable about world affairs, but McCain is seen as better-informed than Obama.

Obama is seen as able to improve the U.S. image in the world - something most American say is important to do.

As for the Vice Presidential candidates, both continue to receive net overall positive ratings from voters. Sarah Palin remains more familiar to voters than Joe Biden.

Women's views of Sarah Palin are more divided now than they have been in recent weeks, with her unfavorable rating rising. In this poll, 34% of women view her favorably, while 33% view her unfavorably. Last week, 36% of women held a positive opinion of Palin, with 32% viewing her negatively; and after the Republican convention, just 19% of women voters had an unfavorable opinion of the Alaska Governor; 47% had a favorable view of her.

Still, 38% of white women have a favorable opinion of the Republican Vice Presidential nominee. Those with a college degree are twice as likely as those without a college education to view Palin negatively. White women without a college degree are more likely to be undecided, but those with an opinion are favorable.

This poll was conducted among a random sample of 936 adults nationwide, including 844 registered voters, interviewed by telephone September 21-24, 2008. Phone numbers were dialed from RDD samples of both standard land-lines and cell phones. The error due to sampling for results based on the entire sample could be plus or minus three percentage points, plus or minus four points for the sample of registered voters. The error for subgroups is higher.
