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WHERE THE RACE STANDS AFTER THE FIRST DEBATE September 27-30, 2008

The Democratic ticket of Barack Obama and Joe Biden leads Republicans John McCain and Sarah Palin by nine percentage points among registered voters -- higher than Obama's lead last week, before Friday's first presidential debate. Obama's increased lead may be due to several factors: Republican President George W. Bush's very low approval rating (22% in this poll, the lowest of his presidency), concerns about the financial crisis facing the country, and perceptions that Obama would better manage the economy than John McCain.

Far more voters think Obama won the first presidential debate than say McCain did, and enthusiasm among Obama's supporters has risen.

The race is similar among likely voters; Obama has a nine-point lead among that group.

About one in four voters remains uncommitted - they either say they could still change their minds about their candidate, or are undecided entirely. That percentage has not changed much in the past few weeks.

Obama's voters continue to be more enthusiastic than McCain's voters about their candidate. And their enthusiasm has increased in the last week, perhaps in part because of the debate.

Majorities of voters for each candidate say they have made up their minds about who to vote for, but McCain's support in this poll appears softer than Obama's. 21% of McCain's voters say it is too soon to say for sure who they will vote for, compared to 14% of Obama's voters.

THE ECONOMY AND THE RACE

The economic events of the past week, along with rising concerns about the economy among voters, may have contributed to Obama's current lead in this poll. Nearly nine in 10 voters rate the economy negatively now, including half who say it is very bad, and three quarters say it is getting worse. By a large margin, Obama wins the votes of those who say the economy is now very bad.

Obama has a clear edge over McCain on managing the economy - although relatively few voters say they are very confident in either candidate.

Obama gets higher marks than McCain for his handling of the financial crisis (though neither gets majority approval). Most voters think McCain's attempts last week to affect the Congressional negotiations made no impact on them.

ASSESSING THE FIRST DEBATE

According to all registered voters, Barack Obama won last Friday's presidential debate, the first in a series of three. Even more debate watchers, 51%, said the Democratic candidate did the better job.

While most voters said the debate did not affect their opinions of either candidate, more than twice as many said that the debate improved their opinion of Obama as said it improved their opinion of McCain. Many of those who say the debate improved their image of a candidate are supporting that candidate, although it is not clear whether the debate moved them.

OBAMA VS. MCCAIN ON QUALITIES: LITTLE CHANGE SINCE THE DEBATE

The debate has done little to change voters' perceptions of Obama and McCain on many candidate characteristics.

- Obama continues to have an advantage on handling the economy, but a number of voters are not confident in either candidate's ability to take on the country's top issue.
- McCain has an edge on Iraq; more are very confident that he would make the right decisions on that issue.

• McCain continues to be seen as the candidate more likely to be an effective commander-in-chief, but 31% now say Obama is "very likely" to be an effective commander-in-chief -- the highest number he has seen in CBS News Polls.

Each candidate has the same weaknesses he did before last week's debate.

- Obama has a clear advantage on empathy: 67% say Obama understands their needs and problems; fewer 46% think McCain does.
- More still see McCain as being prepared to be President: six in 10 think he is prepared for the job. But 52% now say Obama is prepared, up six points from before the debate.

• Voters continue to think McCain cares more about large corporations than ordinary people, while they think Obama would favor people over corporations.

• Each candidate is perceived as having a different approach to decision-making. Voters see Obama as more likely to not act quickly enough, while McCain is perceived as more likely to act too quickly.

OVERALL VIEWS OF THE CANDIDATES

Overall opinions of Obama are a bit more positive than they were last week, while views of McCain have become more negative. 48% of voters now have a favorable opinion of Obama - his highest to date. As for McCain, more voters (42%) now have an unfavorable opinion of the Republican nominee than a favorable one (39%). The last time this occurred was in July.

OBAMA VS. MCCAIN: DEMOGRAPHICS

Obama is leading among women and moderates. He now has the support of about two in three voters who supported Hillary Clinton for the Democratic nomination.

<u>McCain is leading</u> among white voters (as he has been), including white men. White Catholics and white evangelicals also support McCain, as do conservatives.

Obama has a small lead among independents in this poll. Last week, this group narrowly backed McCain.

The race is close among men (McCain had a 5-point lead among them last week) and among white women.

Support for each candidate among their party's base groups (liberals and Democrats for Obama, conservatives, evangelicals and Republicans for McCain) has remained consistent. Independent voters have divided almost evenly between the two candidates since the conventions — except for a brief time immediately following the Republican Convention when McCain led among independents by nearly two to one.

VIEWS OF THE VICE PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATES

Opinions of Palin are divided now: 32% view her favorably, but 33% view her unfavorably. The vice presidential nominee enjoyed an eight point net positive rating last week. Biden's ratings have not changed much in the last week, and are generally positive.

Women's views of Palin have changed since the Republican convention. More women now view the Republican vice presidential nominee unfavorably than favorably.

This poll was conducted among a random sample of 1,257 adults nationwide, including 1,113 registered voters, interviewed by telephone September 27-30, 2008. Phone numbers were dialed from RDD samples of both standard land-lines and cell phones. The error due to sampling for results based on the entire sample could be plus or minus three percentage points, and plus or minus three points for the sample of registered voters. The error for subgroups is higher.
