Kekoa Kaapu attended Kahuku School and is a graduate of Kamehameha Schools and Harvard University. He has served as a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, administrative assistant to Governor John A. Burns, Delegate to Hawaii Constitutional Conventions in 1968 and 1978, a member of the Honolulu City Council for two terms, and deputy city managing director for housing and urban development for the City & County of Honolulu. He is publisher of The Hawaii Public Interest Advocate. High among his many accomplishments he authored the bill which became the Mass Transit Act of 1967.
